After getting solut of prison, Howell-El was told that he owed the money. He no longer had the money that he saved during his prison years, especially with all of the fees. He is an ex-con and realized, how could he possibly pay the price of living, along with all of the other fees he owes, after just being released into an entirely different world, one that is so different from what it was back in the 80°s.
